

<ul style="list-style-type: none">• A UK survey found that people between the age of 10 – 73 have experienced stalking. The victims were both men and women and all had different backgrounds.• Examples of stalking include following a person, appearing at a person's home or place of business, making harassing phone calls, leaving written messages, or vandalising a person's property.• Some examples of exploitation young adults may experience are sexual, labour and domestic.• Forced marriage is illegal in the UK and is punishable by a prison sentence of up to 7 years.• Marriage is no longer allowed in the UK for anyone under the age of 18, regardless of consent, due to the Marriage and Civil Partnership Act 2022 which came into force in February 2023.	Stalking	The crime of stalking can be simply described as the unwanted pursuit of another person.
	Harassment	If someone is abusing, insulting, or otherwise harming you on a regular basis, it's called harassment. Harassment is a word that describes any kind of ongoing torment.
	Marriage	The legal union of two people.
	Forced Marriage	When one or both people do not consent to the marriage.
	Coercion	The action of persuading someone to do something by using force or threats.
	Exploitation	Treating someone unfairly to benefit from them.



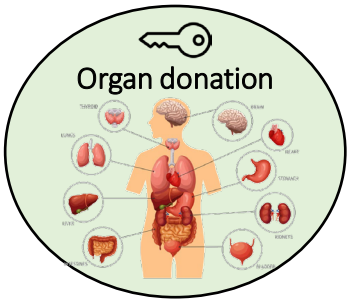
