

Health and Wellbeing How do I look after my mental wellbeing? This unit is about ensuring you understand what mental health is and the key signs to look for when recognising poor mental health. The unit

will look at common mental health problems young people may face, healthy & unhealthy strategies of coping with poor mental health & where to seek support for these health issues.

Healthy Relationships How do I identify and challenge discriminative behaviours?

This unit will examine the types of discrimination that exist in society. We will look at racism, sexism, homophobia, transphobia and religious discrimination. This unit is about identifying unacceptable behaviour and the language we should and should not be using in society today.



We will also look at how we can tackle discrimination, including the laws around discrimination.

Living in the Wider World

What opportunities are out there?

This unit is about developing an understanding of what working life is about. It will give you an insight into the career opportunities out there & support you in setting aspirational goals for your future. This will support you in making choices later, such as your GCSE option choices.



Health and Well Being

How can my lifestyle choices impact my health?

This unit is about making good choices when it comes to your health. It will focus on the negative choices such as drugs, smoking & alcohol and how these choices can be detrimental to your future and your health. It will also look at the laws surrounding these intoxicants.

Healthy Relationships

What is identity & how can I keep safe in relationships?

This unit will explore the concept of identity, including sexual and gender identity. It will examine some of the risks that come with an intimate relationship and the consequences and laws surrounding these risks.

How do I keep myself safe online?

This unit is about ensuring you understand how to stay say online. It will examine a range of issues such as private and public sharing, age restrictions, grooming and the world of online advertisements.

Undermining an individual's sense of self-worth and/or Sexual abuse self-esteem including constant criticism or name-calling. Making or attempt to make an individual financially **Emotional** abuse dependent by maintaining total control over financial resources. Hitting, slapping, shoving, grabbing, pinching, biting, hair Economic abuse pulling, etc. Coercing or attempting to coerce any sexual contact or Psychological abuse behaviour without consent.
